Jacob's Ladder and the Devil's Grave (Tomb)

After driving down Lake Road, make a right onto Pembrook Road. It's the first road after the field. The road goes for a 1/4 mile before turning into Jacob's Ladder. You'll know when! At the top of the road off to the left in the woods is the Tomb, about 50 feet back.
