County, New Jersey in 1756.30 John came to New York in the "second immigration in 1710 from the Palatinate."31 German settlement really commenced with the arrival of the 'Palatines' in 1709 and their settlement in the colony of New York. Although the description 'Palatine' really applied only to people from the Palatinate area of the Rhineland (now known as the state or lande of Rheinland- Pfalz), it was also used to describe people from Baden, Bayern, Elsass, Hessen, and Wurttemberg. There were a number of reasons for the great migrations - poor crops, bad winters, heavy taxes, military service, religious persecution and, most of all, the devastation caused by the Thirty Years War (1618-1648) and subsequent invasions of the Rhineland by France in 1673, 1688, and 1707. The winter of 1708-09 was the worst in Europe in more than a century. The intense cold started in October and continued until the end of April, and the vines and fruit trees in the southwest of the German area were destroyed. According to contemporary accounts, birds died in the air and spittle leaving the mouth was ice before it reached the ground. The disaster was total and the future without hope. The 'Palatines' started to arrive in London, England, via Rotterdam in 1708, and in 1709, according to some reports, 30,000 arrived between May and October. The refugees arriving in England had every intention of continuing their journey as soon as possible to Pennsylvania and the Carolinas. However, the English government, faced with a multitude of refugees beyond all expectations, blew hot and cold on the project. Objections were raised by English settlers already in the colonies and efforts were made to arrange settlement on various islands in the Caribbean, in England itself, and in Ireland. Meanwhile the Palatines continued to pour into London, and tented camps were set up in the suburbs, and houses, barns, and warehouses were requisitioned or donated. Inevitably, the refugees were accused of becoming a financial burden, of taking jobs away from the English, and even of introducing the plague into the country. Several of the camps and settlements were attacked by the London mobs and a number of Palatines were killed or wounded. In January, 1710, the first mass sailing to the New World took place - some 600 Palatines left for the Carolinas and later founded the settlement of New Bern. In April 3000 more sailed for New York. (This was probably "the second immigration from the Palatine" mentioned at the outset of this narrative.) Eighteen hundred of them settled on the Hudson some ninety miles north of the city, while the balance stayed in the city itself. In 1712 the financial subsidies from the colonial government to the Hudson River settlers were abruptly ended. They were told they could hire themselves out as servants in New York or New Jersey but nowhere else.32

In the year 1813, German Valley was within the territorial limits of the Presbytery of New Brunswick. When, therefore, the churches of German Valley and Fox Hill determined to enter the Presbyterian connection, they presented their application to the Presbytery of New Brunswick. Their request was made on the 5th of October, 1813, and on the 6th it was granted. On the same day, October 6th, they presented to the Presbytery a call for the pastoral services of Mr. Jacob R. Castner, to labor in each of the churches one-third of the time. Mr. Castner was a native of Somerset county, brought up near Pluckamin. He had been licensed by the Presbytery of New Brunswick, at Newton, January 15th, 1812. He had preached in the Valley for a little time before the call was made out, and it was partly on this account, and through his influence, that the congregation had decided to connect themselves with the Presbyterians.

On the 9th of November Presbytery met in German Valley for the purpose of ordaining and installing Mr. Castner. He was first examined as to his views of the sacraments and church government. He then preached his trial sermon. These exercises proving satisfactory, Presbytery proceeded with the ordination and installation services.

When Mr. Castner came here the church consisted of thirty-seven members.... and, partly as a consequence of [a] long vacancy, the state of religion and morals was not very encouraging. The new pastor, therefore, set himself to work as a reformer of abuses. Mr. Castner was admirably fitted for this. He was a man of superior mind, strong convictions, both as to truth and duty, great perservance and energy, and a spirit that was perfectly fearless.

[A contemporary ministerial colleague] says of him: "What virtuous mind that knew him did not love and admire him? Had all my hearers known him, as many of them did, my task were done when his name was pronounced. But all did not know him. Bodily he was rather under medium stature; but his frame was lithe, compact and firmly knit. Dark hair, a keen and penetrating dark eye, acquiline features, a brow betokening great powers of thought, a mouth and chin indicating great firmness of purpose and of principle, a manner and gate quick and determined, made him a man of marked presence. He possessed a mind of decided force and acuteness. He grasped a subject with strength, and wielded it with power. He was a natural orator; and one of the best, if not the very best, extempore speakers in the Presbytery or the Synod. His readiness in this respect was probably a hindrance to the full development of his really great powers. His very active and laborious habits, and the multitude of his preachings, led him to rely too much on his extempore powers, and prevented that culture in the study that would have made him one of the most polished and impressive pulpit orators of his generation. As it was, he was an able, laborious and successful minister of the Word. An early and fearless champion of the temperance reformation, he probably did more for that cause than any other man in the bounds of the Presbytery. Once convinced that a thing was right, nothing could swerve him from its advocacy. He was utterly fearless - a man of unwavering moral courage. But whilst bold as a lion in defending the right and denouncing the wrong, he was gentle as a lamb and tender as a woman in the intercourse of social life. A warmhearted friend, a sympathizing comforter, he was one of the most interesting conversers I ever met. A natural gentleman, he could be firm without arrogance, and entertaining without egotism. He was almost idolized in his congregation and was respected and beloved by his brethren and throughout the churches. Born at Liberty Comer, he pursued his classical studies at Baskingridge and Princeton, and studied theology under Dr. Finley, of Baskingridge, for whom he always cherished great veneration. German Valley, Fox Hill and Black River [Chester], were the first field of his labors. At the formation of the Presbytery of Newton he was pastor of Mansfield (Washington, N.J.), in which he was settled in 1820, and here he continued until on the 26th of April, 1848, when he was suddenly arrested by the hand of death.

The first one of note was rather a series of trials, growing out of the murder case of Joseph Carter, Jr., Abner Parke, and Peter W. Parke, in 1843 and 1844. These persons were indicted for the murder of John Castner, Maria Castner, his wife, Mary Matilda Castner, daughter of John and Maria Castner, and John B. Parke, brother of Peter W. Parke. These murders were committed at Changewater,

in Warren County, and were of such an inhuman and revolting character to send a shudder of horror through the whole county and wherever the deed was known. The perpetrators also attempted to kill Jesse Force, a bound boy in the family, striking him on the head with a hatchet and leaving him, as they supposed, dead or in a dying condition. Indictments were found against Carter and the Parkes at the June term of Oyer and Terminer, 1843, and the trials began at the September term, when Carter was tried upon the first issue of the series, for the murder of John Castner. The trial was protracted, and created a great deal of public excitement. Sixty-six witnesses were examined for the prosecution, and twenty-nine for the defense. On the 14th of September the jury returned a verdict of "Not guilty." After his acquittal Carter was admitted to bail in the sum of fifteen thousand dollars. In 1844 he was brought to another trial, the issue this time being upon the murder of John B. Parke. He was convicted, and so also was Peter W. Parke, a nephew of the murdered man, John B. Parke. Abner Parke, a brother of John B. Parke, and Henry C. Hummer were tried upon separate indictments in the same general case, and acquitted. These trials revealed a marvelous network of circumstantial evidence, holding the criminals so completely within its meshes as to render escape from justice impossible. It was skillfully woven around them by the tact and eloquence of able counsel, and the public sense endorsed the justice of the convictions. Few murders have left a more profound impression of the enormity or of the guilt of the perpetrators upon the county than these. Joseph Carter and Peter W. Parke were hung in Belvidere, within an inclosure in front of the court-house in 1845." "Just north of Changewater are the graves of Carter and Parkes, who were hung in the year 1844 for the murder of the Castner family, - John Castner, his wife, and infant child. All were residents of this township, Parks living in the village of Washington. The latter was a brother of Castner's wife. Carter was one of the overseers of highways. The Castner family resided near Changewater, where two sons, the only survivors of the tragedy, now reside. The Castner farm, of 71 acres, was sold in December, 1880

This would indicate that she was born before July 28, 1867. Eliza and Elijah were married on November 11, 1866. This means that Cora was born less than 9 months after the marriage. She was probably the child of Elijah. (Tsk, Tsk, a shotgun marriage at his age, which was 63.)

Elijah and his first wife, Elizabeth Hoover, were both born in New Jersey, he in 1806 and she about 1808. They were married in Hunterdon County in 1827, moved to Pennsylvania between 1830 and 1833, and by 1840 were living in Kingston Township.

Elijah "initially located in Mill Hollow, where he purchased 200 acres of unreclaimed land, some of which he cleared, and afterward he sold it all at a profit. He then moved to nearby Plymouth, where he also engaged in farming for a number of years..." The U.S. agricultural census of Plymouth Township carried out in September, 1850, shows Elijah living on a 60 acre farm, 30 acres of which have been improved. The owner of 2 horses, 2 milk cows and 6 swine, he raised wheat, rye, oats, potatoes,

buckwheat and hay, and produced 100 pounds of butter. He was not one of the more prosperous farmers in the area (even though he was about 45 at the time). He cultivated 30 acres, while the average of the 64 farms in the area was 74. The cash value of his farm was \$800, while the average was close to \$5000. The ratio of food production and livestock holdings were similar.

The 1850 U.S. population census indicated that Elijah's household included his wife and 7 children ranging in age from 17 years down to 1 month. The 1860 population census lists a much-reduced household consisting of the 55 year-old Elijah, his 18 year-old son Hiram and his 14 year-old daughter Elizah. What happened to the rest of the family? Elijah's other children probably had moved out, since they were old enough, and most of his children are reported to have survived to maturity. It is probable that his first Elizabeth wife died between the 1850 and 1860 census. The 1860 agricultural census (although unreadable in part because of faded ink) indicates a deterioration in Elijah's farm assets. While his improved acreage has increased from 30 to 40, his farm is now worth only \$100. He has only 1 horse, 1 cow and 4 swine, a significant reduction from 10 years previously. Whether this was due to poor health, poor luck, poor management, or reduced need because of a smaller family living at home is not clear.

It appears that Elijah was married a second time, perhaps in Pennsylvania, to a woman named Crechy Kitchen.

Elijah "finally went to Ohio, where he also engaged in farming for a number of years, where he now resides, a well-to-do farmer. He is a man of large experience in agricultural pursuits, and a through-going man of business. His family numbered ten children, eight of whom came to maturity, and are yet living, Hiram being the fifth by birth." Elijah made the move to Ohio after the 1860 census, and subsequently married there for the third time on November 11, 1866 to Eliza A. Phillips in Hocking County. The 1870 census indicates that he was a modestly prosperous farmer in the vicinity of Gibisonville, Ohio, in the south-central part of the State near the present-day town of Logan. The writer assumes that Elijah died in that area sometime after 1892, since the "History of Luzerne County," written in 1892, indicates he was still living at that time.
